This memorandum describes the reports.

# 1. FY 2011-12 Second Quarter Budget vs. Actual Financial Report

The TJPA Board approved the FY 2011-12 TJPA budget in June 2011. Two amendments to the capital budget have been approved, by the Executive Director at September 20 and December 20. The overall budget did not increase through these amendments; amounts were just transferred between line items.

Accounting reports have been summarized to show budget versus actual amounts for expenditures and revenues through the second quarter of fiscal year 2011-12 (July 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011) unaudited for both the capital and operating budgets. The FY 2011-12 second quarter budget versus actual financial report is Attachment 1. This report indicates that expenditures to date are within the available budget.

# 2. Status of Purchase Orders and Contracts Greater than \$25,000 as of December 31, 2011 TJPA staff periodically reports to the Board on the status of contracts greater than \$25,000. As shown in Attachment 2, expenditures as of December 31, 2011 are within the contract certification amounts. In general, procurement activities are proceeding as planned. Additional details for each contract are noted in the report.

Data on Disadvantaged and Small Business Enterprise (DBE/SBE) utilization is also included for each contract. The TJPA Annual Anticipated DBE Participation Level (AADPL) for the three Federal Fiscal Years begun October 1, 2010, which was calculated based on contracts planned to be awarded during the three year time period, is 18.5%. The actual DBE commitment for contracts awarded thus far is 15% and the actual SBE commitment is 39%. Actual payments to DBEs and SBEs through the first quarter of Federal Fiscal Year 2011-12 (October 1, 2011 – December 31, 2011) were \$32.5 million.

# 3. Quarterly Investment & Earnings Report as of December 31, 2011

The primary objectives, in priority order, for the TJPA's investment activities are safety, liquidity, and return on investment. The TJPA's permitted investment instruments are governed by California Government Code and the TJPA Board-approved Investment Policy. All cash, other than cash held in escrow for contractor retention, is currently held in one of three accounts: 1) an insured/collateralized checking account with U.S. Bank, 2) the City & County of San Francisco Treasurer's investment pool, or 3) a trust account with Deutsche Bank National Trust. The Investment & Earnings report (Attachment 3) from the TJPA Chief Financial Officer identifies the balance in each of these accounts at the end of the quarter.

For the quarter ending December 31, 2011, interest earnings from the City Treasurer's Pool were \$5,723. The annualized rate of return for the quarter was 0.90% with an ending cash balance in the pool of \$2,539,291.

Due to the low interest rate environment, the U.S. Bank account is currently set up with an earnings credit rate, meaning that any earnings offset bank fees. Thus no interest earnings are reported in the investment report for the bank account. TJPA holds only the amount necessary for upcoming cash disbursements in the bank account.

The first deposit into the Deutsche Bank trust account TJPA has established for Gross Sales Proceeds from former state parcels was made on October 12, 2011. Under the Cooperative Agreement between the TJPA, the State, and the City, the City acquired "Parcel B" and in turn transferred the parcel to the Redevelopment Agency for construction of a very low-income supportive housing development. Prior to the transfer, the City swapped a corner of Parcel B for a corner of the abutting 515 Folsom property with the private landowner of 515 Folsom, to square off each parcel. As the City received a smaller portion of land than the owner of 515 Folsom, the owner of 515 Folsom also paid the City an additional fee. This additional fee was Gross Sales Proceeds under the Cooperative Agreement, and thus deposited into the TJPA's trust account to be used for future construction costs. TJPA has purchased \$68,000 of U.S. Treasury Notes due December 31, 2012 with these proceeds. Further details on this investment position are shown in Attachment 3.

# 4. Inception to December 31, 2011 Capital Expenditures and Revenues

The Inception to Date Expenditures and Revenues (unaudited) report (Attachment 4) provides an overview of the TJPA's capital expenditures and revenues from the beginning of the program through December 31, 2011. Summary level information is provided by major expenditure category and revenue source.

# 5. Project Labor Agreement Status

The Project Labor Agreement (PLA) for the Transbay Transit Center was approved on November 10, 2011. The PLA is designed to ensure labor peace and equal opportunity for small, local, disadvantaged, union, and non-union businesses throughout the construction of the Transit Center, providing standard working conditions and wages. Staff will report to the TJPA Board on a quarterly basis regarding the administration of the PLA, including information on topics such as the meetings of the Joint Administrative Committee and outreach to youth and veterans for apprenticeships and other project opportunities. This status report is Attachment 5.

# PROJECT LABOR AGREEMENT STATUS REPORT March 8, 2012

The Project Labor Agreement (PLA) for the Transbay Transit Center Program was approved on November 10, 2011. The PLA is designed to ensure labor peace and equal opportunity for small, local, disadvantaged, union, and non-union businesses throughout construction, providing standardized working conditions and wages. This quarterly report provides information on the status of the administration of the PLA and the apprenticeship plan that was developed in conjunction with the PLA.

Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) Webcor/Obayashi and Construction Management Oversight (CMO) consultant Turner Construction both signed letters of assent to the PLA on February 14, 2012. Current trade subcontractors M Squared and Balfour Beatty Infrastructure are reviewing the PLA and considering their decision to sign the letter of assent. Assenting to the PLA will be a requirement of all future bidders on the project.

There have been no work stoppages or labor incidents on the project. CM/GC Webcor/Obayashi and their trade subcontractors have reported no issues in having access to skilled labor in sufficient numbers. Each subcontractor's workforce requirements have been met.

#### **SAFETY**

One recordable safety incident occurred between November 1 and February 29. An employee of Balfour Beatty Infrastructure sprained his ankle rolling up a tarp on February 13. He was taken to St. Francis Hospital for treatment. As the doctor prescribed medication, this is a recordable incident. The employee returned to modified duty. No other recordable incidents have occurred in this timeframe.

## **JOINT ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE**

Each party has designated its members of the Joint Administrative Committee (JAC). The TJPA representatives are Maria Ayerdi-Kaplan, with Robert Beck as alternate, and Brian Dykes, with Emilio Cruz as alternate. The labor representatives are Michael Thériault and John O'Rourke, with Larry Mazzola, Jr. and Tim Donovan as alternates. The labor representatives are subject to change pending discussions among the signatory trades.

The first JAC meeting was held on February 23. Rules of order for the JAC were established and quarterly reporting requirements were discussed. Future meetings will be held no less than quarterly.

#### **APPRENTICESHIPS**

The TJPA and the Unions wish to use the economic activity generated by the design and construction of the Transit Center and related facilities to support meaningful job training. In order to facilitate professional and skilled trade development opportunities for high school students, the economically disadvantaged, and military veterans, as part of the PLA process TJPA developed a plan to promote opportunities for youth and adults, particularly from disadvantaged backgrounds, and veterans to enter careers in architecture, engineering, construction, and skilled trades. The TJPA agreed to work with the Unions and Contractors to pursue the following methods of achieving its goals in this regard:

- 1. Encourage donations of supplies and equipment from Project contractors and vendors to San Francisco Unified School District (District) programs.
- 2. Integrate the "multi-trade core curriculum" and other standards and best practices in District programs.
- 3. Host periodic student and counselor tours of the Project jobsite and architectural, engineering, and contractor offices.
- 4. Participate in job fairs and other opportunities to describe the career paths for architecture, engineering, and skilled crafts and trades to District students.
- 5. Promote internship opportunities for District students on Project work.
- 6. Collaborate with District instructors and curriculum developers to incorporate real-world lessons from TJPA work in the District's Career and Technical Education (CTE) curricula.
- 7. Facilitate the successful transition from District programs to apprenticeships.
- 8. Utilize the services of the Center for Military Recruitment Helmet to Hardhats program to serve as a resource for preliminary orientation, assessment of construction aptitude, referral to apprenticeship programs or hiring halls, counseling and mentoring, support network, employment opportunities and other needs identified by the parties.

- 9. Coordinate with the Center to create and maintain an integrated database of veterans interested in working on the Project and of apprenticeship and employment opportunities for the Project.
- 10. Request the Helmets to Hardhats Program to report on a monthly basis the total number of intakes and to provide a quarterly report on the status of ongoing outreach efforts to increase participation.
- 11. Strive to identify opportunities suitable for disabled veterans pursuant to the Wounded Warriors Program.

To successfully meet these objectives, the TJPA has established a working relationship with the District and Enterprise for High School Students (EHSS), as well as the Helmets to Hardhats organization. Program Management/Program Controls Administrator Doug Hawley has been appointed as the TJPA lead in these efforts.

#### **Progress to Date - Students**

TJPA has met with the marketing representative of Carpenters Union Local #22 at John O'Connell High School to tour the carpentry shop that was recently built and speak with the instructor and students. TJPA, Contractor, and Union representatives all attended the carpentry shop ribbon cutting on December 8, 2011. This shop is the initial milestone achieved in bringing back skilled crafts and trades to the public high school curriculum and represents a viable blueprint for the parties working together to ensure that similar craft and trade shops and safety curricula can be duplicated at other schools.

Carpenters Union Local #22 has donated books from the United Brotherhood of Carpenters Training Center to O'Connell for the woodshop curriculum, and is looking into the possibility of facilitating direct entry into their pre-apprenticeship program for O'Connell graduating seniors. Local #22 will also be presenting \$500 scholarships to one senior each at Mission, Galileo, Balboa and Lincoln High Schools in San Francisco this spring.

Webcor/Obayashi has donated a wood joiner, ten tool boxes with starter tools, more than 150 pairs of gloves, plus miscellaneous tools for the auto shop program.

TJPA has identified professional staff to visit high school classes identified by the District and speak with students entering the CTE program about the numerous and varied skills required in the design and construction of the Project. Most recently, engineers from the TJPA's Program Management team spoke with the students at Burton High School on March 1, 2012 (Attachment A). Plans are underway for students to tour the project site, as work and safety considerations permit.

TJPA will also continue its implementation of a high school student summer internship program wherein the TJPA works directly with the District and Enterprise for High School Students (EHSS) to provide students interested in architecture, engineering and government relations with 6-week-long summer internships on the Project. Since the program began in 2008, eleven high school students have participated as TJPA or Program Management interns, and up to five more students will participate in the 2012 summer session. This program has proven highly successful, is one of the programs of choice coveted by District students, and is well respected by the District, EHSS, and the National Academy Foundation, an organization that fosters partnerships between the business and education communities to provide opportunities to underserved students.

# **Progress to Date - Veterans**

On February 22, Darrell Roberts, the Executive Director of Helmets to Hardhats, presented to the TJPA, its professional services consultants and construction contractors, and union representatives. Mr. Roberts

outlined the Helmets to Hardhats mission to train and identify job opportunities for military veterans reentering the workforce and provided contacts and Helmets to Hardhats program information to all attendees.

Working with Helmets to Hardhats and the Non-Commissioned Officers Association (NCOA), the TJPA has identified all veteran-related job fairs for 2012 and will work with the parties to the PLA to sponsor booths at the agreed upon events, the first of which will be on August 2, 2012, on the USS Hornet in Alameda. TJPA and the CM/GC will also be meeting periodically with Union representatives to review upcoming subcontract packages and the trades which will be involved to forecast upcoming workforce needs, and these opportunities will be provided to Helmets to Hardhats representatives for outreach to veterans.

Additionally, the TJPA contacted Swords to Plowshares (STP) regarding its March 2, 2012, job fair at the War Memorial Building and Mr. Hawley attended the job fair to talk with veterans about Helmets to Hardhats and other resources.

# **Progress to Date - Adults**

Carpenters Union Local #22 has conducted outreach to promote apprenticeship programs and opportunities, speaking at the San Francisco Conservation Corps and the CCSF Workforce Development Division. Local #22 also has nine apprentices currently working on the Transbay project.

Operating Engineers Local #3 has been working with and reaching out to many community organizations, schools and colleges throughout Northern California, including CityBuild; Mission Hiring Hall; Young Community Developers, a non-profit organization that provides a variety of training and support opportunities for residents of the Bayview Hunters Point neighborhood of San Francisco; and Anders & Anders, a non-profit foundation whose mission is to break the cycle of recidivism of ex-offenders through job training programs and job preparedness placement opportunities, focusing on job recruitment in the Visitacion Valley neighborhood. Local #3 provides a coordinator for each apprentice that offers coaching and schedules training classes. There are currently four apprentices and two CityBuild graduate apprentices on the Transbay project from Local #3.

Laborers Local #261 has a Joint Apprenticeship Training Committee that recognizes the following preapprenticeships for "direct entry" into their apprenticeship program: CityBuild, San Francisco Conservation Corp, JobTrain, Cypress Mandela, and San Joaquin YouthBuild. Additionally, Local #261 has strong partnerships with City College of San Francisco, Mission Hiring Hall, Mission Neighborhood Centers, and Young Community Developers. Local #261 had 36 apprentices on the project in November and December 2011, twelve of those from CityBuild and three from JobTrain.

Information on the efforts of other unions and the Bay Area Apprenticeship Council Association will be included in future reports as it is available. Additionally, Webcor/Obayashi has designated a staff person to coordinate apprenticeship compliance and data collection across all of its subcontractors. A discussion of apprenticeship participation by craft and by subcontractor is scheduled to be on the agenda of the next JAC meeting.
